



The View From the Rear

(Musings of a Casual Racer)

On Getting High


Thank goodness boats are built close to the ground. Well not the ground so much, but mine is at about sea level on deck. I just don't like getting high. Oh it was easier when I was younger. When I was a kid I'd do it just for fun. Climb



the "ghost" tree out my back window. Climb the cedar tree in the front yard. It didn't seem like such a big deal. Sure there was the day I had to wait for mom to come home from work and get me down, but it wasn't the high that bugged me, it was the getting down.

When I was in high school I did it for money. First as a carpenter working for my father and later painting my sister's house. I won't say I liked being high, it was just what you had to do as a "man" doing a "man's job." Somewhere in my early twenties, being high began to lose all appeal. My lack of tolerance for being high was made clear to me on a group camping trip to Silver Falls in Oregon. I had climbed what I thought to be incredibly high into a tree and was surveying the adjacent field. Suddenly my friend Dan came bounding by me on the tree and continued up another 30 feet or more. At that height he was causing the tree to sway so much that 30 feet below it was scaring the bajeepers out of me!

Maybe, just maybe, I was scared of being high. And ladders, well ladders, I'm not real big on those at all. I own three, but that is just a homeowner/adulating necessity. And extension ladders are the worst – when extended. You climb and they bounce and bounce. Engineering school did not help this. In engineering school you do countless "free body diagrams". the Cal 21 was easy. Need to work on the mast. Take it down and lay it out. Sirena Gorda, our Cal 2-27 we owned for almost four years. It had a burned out mast head tri-color when we bought it – and when we sold it. Once I thought I could put a short extension ladder against the mast supported by a halyard and then go up. I couldn't.

And we come to Naughty By Nature – 56+ feet of lofty majesty. One of the taller sticks around. Shortly after buying her it was pointed out that one of the spreaders was off. I did the logical thing and hired "Something Special". "Good to test them out before I really needed something.

But it kind of ate at me that I just wasn't going to get high on this boat. I bought myself a bosun's chair. A good one! I carried that chair for two years as the green on the bottom of the spreaders spread. I waited probably another year for the time when I was both stone cold sober and felt actually willing to try the assent.

Finally, summer before last, at Longbranch on a club outing, a group of hearty club members hauled me up the stick. Armed with Windex, a rag, a knife and a roll of rigging tape I cleaned the spreaders and taped the boots. No need to go to the top. Nothing wrong up there. I even took pictures. And you know, it wasn't that bad. In fact, next time I need to get high on the boat – I think I'll buy Brock a beer and send him up!
