

So when an opportunity came to attend the first Coho Seminar for 2018 I thought, I have to go see what it's all about. The Seminar was held at Fisheries Supply in Seattle and the guest speaker was Skip Anderson of Flagship Maritime. He spoke about



Captains, Good, Bad and Ugly. What makes a good captain. Dealing with the many boats which have intentions of making this voyage and people wanting to crew a few things to consider before embarking. Communications, does he or she have radios in working condition. Is the vessel insured properly. Overall condition of the boat. If you have reservations from what you've seen, probably not a good idea to be on that boat.

As far as the Captain goes, some things to watch for. Does he pay attention to surroundings such as fog, marine life, other vessels in the area. Charts, does he have them and are they being used. Unfortunately, these things you won't know until you're actually underway. Everyone should be paying attention inside the lifelines as well. Not every crew member will be experienced in Blue Water sailing. So it's important that the captain know the experience level of the crew. Ask questions of the Captain. Talk to others who have perhaps sailed with him before. In the words of Skip Anderson, "The sea doesn't care about you." and "Your fulfillment on the water hinges on the decisions you make in each moment." "Get your Captains License."

I came away knowing a bit more than when I went in. Is it for me? Probably not yet. I need to be more informed and may do the rest of the seminars. In attendance were people who have done this trek many times and are ready to do it again. There are 12 seminars leading up to the departure on August 10-12 or September 7-9. If you're interested in only attending the seminars the cost is \$199.00. If you want to join the group the cost is \$595.00. This includes all the seminars, Sponsor Discounts, field trips and raft-ups, plus probably a couple parties in Newport, Oregon and San Francisco, and fleet map tracking using Delorme InReach devices. Two of those months in very expensive Shilshole Marina. And the Lovely and Gracious Mrs. St. John keeps reminding me that every payday she gives up \$250 to the 401K loan that helped purchase La Sirena, our Seahorse Mandarin 52.

parts, and small boat stuff for years. I got into sailing by selling a guitar I bought for \$600 for \$1400. More often I don't make money but maybe improve what I have. I know my prices, I strive to be fair and give each party a good deal. I like this stuff.

Selling houses, cars, boats? No thank you. The stakes are higher. The uncertainties bigger. It makes my tummy ooky!

So Naughty sat. She waited. Her shore power cord got knocked lose. Meanwhile, we were trying to get familiar with a big, cold (for the winter at least) new boat. While Naughty sat, were busy

dealing with a truism of owning large objects like homes, RVs and boats. They don't like to be left alone. During a year of inactivity, Sun Wah, now La Sirena, had developed a host of gremlins, most of them electrical. (In actuality, she is still plagued, I should just wear my multimeter around my neck.)

And Naughty sat. "I should just drop by and check on things", I'd tell myself. Turn on some heat? Empty the dehumidifier?



The buyer stewed for a week. The broker talked to him. I talked to him. Finally, a counter offer was made. The price fell. My




