As summer comes to a close, I hope everyone had a chance to enjoy our hot weather, albeit smoky at times. It's time to prepare our boats for the fall/winter racing and cruising seasons. I want to focus on one particular safety item which probably doesn't get the attention it should, our fire extinguishers. I'm hoping that you have at least the correct number and type of Coast



Guard approved extinguishers for your particular boat. They should be placed in easily visible locations near the galley, engine compartment and all living spaces. A fire is most likely to be in the galley or engine compartment, but what if you're in the cockpit and can't get to an extinguisher down below? It is now advisable, as I read Practical Sailor by Captain Lanier, an accredited marine surveyor, to put one in the cockpit. Perhaps in a locker clearly market "FIRE EXTINGUISHER". They also must be inspected and tagged yearly by a fire extinguisher specialist. It's also good practice to inspect them monthly, which I did not know, for loss of pressure, corrosion, damaged mounting brackets, clogged nozzles, Etc. Another useful device to have onboard is a fire blanket. A Fire blanket is designed to extinguish a fire just beginning, especially in the galley. It is made from a sheet of fire retardant material and when placed over a fire, smothers it by cutting off the oxygen supply. For further information, see United States Coast Guard website for a more detailed explanation of the various kinds of fire extinguishers required for our boats.

I also want to thank everyone who participated in the 1st Tacoma Pink Boat Regatta. The turnout was beyond what I expected. I'm very proud of you.

Don't forget there will be elections at the October General Meeting. Don't be shy, we need you! You can nominate yourself!




