

Also, mark your calendars for Saturday, December 15. This is the date for our Christmas party. It will be held again at the Browns Point Improvement Club, (Continues page 3)



## Rear Commodore

I'm always on the lookout for subjects that peak my interest regarding sailing or the boating world in general. I'm such a novice and am always on a learning curve. While scanning Boat US magazine, I came across an article titled "What Women Want In Boating," and it addresses what women, men, and the boating industry can do to encourage or promote a balance.



What women can do. MANAGE FEAR. I dare say we all have a fear of something. Docking, MOB, heeling. Whatever your fear is you must acknowledge it. Talk about it. When you do it shows others that it's ok to have doubt, anxiety and worry as Berenike Steiger says, who completed a 4,000 mile sail, much of it solo. GAIN PROFICIENCY. Ask for help, ask questions, a lot of questions about stuff you don't know. Get out on that boat and do it. I should follow that last sentence. BE A MENTOR. REI recently conducted a survey and 63 percent of respondents said they couldn't think of an outdoor female role model. That's sad but we can change that by being more supportive of women in boating by encouraging them to do more. Look at the women in R2AK on board the Sail Like A Girl sailboat. I had the pleasure of attending a speaking engagement on October 18 at TYC sponsored by TWSA. Eight women with various degrees of sailing experience. They all had a determination and willingness to help each other through the smooth sailing as well as uncertainties. They were encouraging to each other.

What men can do. BE A METOR. Women need good role models, male and female. I have had the good fortune of my husband encouraging me to dock our boat, to sail it and allowed me to make many mistakes and not yell at me, but to keep practicing and show patience.

SHARE RESPONSIBILITY. I think it's not about needing to know everything, but at least knowing something about your engine, your electrical systems to name a couple. Again, I should follow those a bit more closely.

What the industry can do. DESIGN GEAR FOR WOMEN. Women aren't all 5'10" and slim build. Women struggle to find clothing and even PFD's to fit.

OFFER COURSES AND TRAINING. Women also want product and boating education. A survey taken found that if courses were offered to both women and men, there was a decline in women wanting to participate.

WOMEN IN THE WORKFORCE. In 2015 International Transport Workers Federation estimated that only 1 to 2 percent of the workforce is women. 

#### SHOVING OFF





It's done. House is sold and paid off. I'm just waiting for the check to clear and La Sirena is ours outright. For the first time in almost 59 years I do not have a house to call a home. What I do have is a big ass boat to call home and a marina to call a neighborhood. Over the last two months we've learned a lot about our new home and our new neighborhood.

First – the neighborhood is quiet. Much has to do with the season I suppose. There just isn't a lot of activity down on the docks. Human activity at least. It's a little strange; it is almost as if we live in a ghost town. It is not all unusual to have the only cars in the lot and to be the only humans on our section of the marina and that's kind of nice. Still, on weekends we talk to our friends as they go out to race or cruise. Also, we've taken on a little neighborhood pride, picking major garbage out of the water, tucking in cords and hoses, and hosing off the occasional seal poop! In a moment I will walk around to Gardyloo and check on her awning (it's a windy day.)

Which brings us to the actual "living" on a boat. Because La Sirena is a B.A.B. we often notice no motion at all unless something large goes by or, like today, winds are piping into the 20s. Generally, in bed I feel rock solid. I may however, develop a hunch. Much of the ceiling in the aft portion of the boat is about 6'-1-1/2". I'm 6'-1". Spring in your step equals bump on your head. And anyone with a European spec'd boat knows to watch out for those rounded companionways.

Your movements become choreographed. Step out of bed, duck for the grab rail in the ceiling. Slide the dehumidifier (a necessity – and we have a second on the way!) to the right to get socks and undies from your drawer. Slide it to the left to get a shirt from the hanging locker. Move the basket to enter the workshop. Move the galley trash to open access to the generator and the recycling bin. It is somewhat like boat Tai Chi!

Then there is the power dance! I've spent over one boat unit (\$1000 you lubbers) on cords and adapters and another .04 units (\$40) on an electrician. We still must mind our power. Walking the 100 paces to the bend in the dock to reset breaker 659 is my main source of exercise. Heat pump or space heater. Space heater or toaster. Oven and dehumidifier but not microwave. It is a constant reassessment of priorities. Assess wrong, and you might see me in my robe and sneakers headed back to the breakers. Warning; come warm weather I may not bother with the robe!

But I won't go without sneakers because of a particular charm of our neighborhood. The wildlife. First among these are the seals. I love seals. They stink though. And their poo – two steps short of icky diarrhea. They poo on the dock and they lay in it. Actually, they lay everywhere. Often in my path. We've counted up to 19 at one time. They are scaredy cats though and will quickly clear a path. We have learned not to leave the dinghy in the water though and I've suspended a fender across the opening to the swim step to keep them off. It is generally around two AM when they want to come aboard for a visit.

Also, there are otters. Cute little buggers. Much more skittish than the seals. Out more at dark, they startle you as you walk near and the dive into the water. Thank goodness they've never tried to board as they have a reputation for making a mess. They have lot more roughage in their diet. Just saying. Don't ask how I know.

The lovely and gracious Mrs. S and I particularly like the great blue herons. Beautiful birds. Amazing when they take off. I also enjoy the various ducks and geese. Rylie is partial to things in the water. Jellyfish, starfish, fish fish, sea anemones, mussels, and shrimp. It can be a long long walk to the car stopping to look at each item.

Something I hadn't considered was the green aspect of boat living. (Climate change is for real and it will take all of us to change its course.) We are plugged into about a third of the power you have in your house and trust me, we aren't able to use half of that. We sip power. And water – I fill one tank once a week. That's 158 gallons max. We've cut down on bathing – no, it's ok. Please come visit. But really, showering and Rylie's baths are cut in about half and the tub is smaller and the showers shorter. I must be proactive on the filling though so you don't have to stop, put on your robe, and stick a hose in the tank. Filling takes 30 minutes. I'm worried about when it freezes and the marina turns off water. I guess I can open the other tank or start filling from 10-gallon jugs filled at work.

Garbage is easy. I don't have to worry about being charged for being overweight. Can full? Take a bag to the dumpster. Recycling is a bit harder. We have no recycling at the marina but there is recycling behind the diner though and I put my personal shredder in my office for things needing shredded.

Entertainment, i.e. TV has been a bit tougher. Rylie and I stop in at the thrift store every few weeks to peruse the DVDs. I've also taken to Ebay for more recent DVDs at bargain prices. I bought a wifi antenna. It makes weak signals strong. Unfortunately, slow internet is still slow. We hotspot off of my phone but I use all of my high-speed time in about 10 days. Still, you can stream quite a bit. In the meantime, we've both upgraded our Kindles.

All in all, I think we like this. I took the day off today. I'm in the pilot house, the sun is on my back. There are boats all about. It's a good life!
