A ditch bag contains key items needed to summon help and survive in a life raft or in the water while waiting for rescue to arrive. It must be kept in an accessible location on board. Be sure your guests know where it is.

The ditch bag is not limited to off shore cruisers. Coastal cruisers should be prepared also. The things to consider for a ditch bag are well, the bag itself. It should be waterproof. There are commercially available bags that are specifically designed for a ditch situation. Make sure it floats. Look for foam buoyancy panels sewn into the sides of the bag. When the bag is loaded with the necessary gear it should not sink. Water resistance: although the bag doesn't need to be waterproof, the water should not enter easily. I would put the items into plastic zip bags and if your bag doesn't float you can cut floatable noo-

It is much easier to get in the dinghy with an open transom as well!

dles and stuff them into the bag. . Visibility: the bag should be an easy to see color especially at night. Some ditch bags include reflective tape sewed on to them. You can also purchase the tape and sew it on your bag too if yours doesn't have it. Inner pockets and dividers must be organized and easy to see. Carry straps and tethers which enables you to secure the bag to yourself. Adequate size: the bag should be large enough for gear, food and water for you and guests. The ditch bag should include several ways to contact help like EPIRB, a waterproof VHF with built-in GPS, flares and orange smoke day flares, a first aid kit, knife, and a Mylar rescue blanket to name a few.

I realize every ditch bag contents may contain many more items. The internet is a great source for finding what will work in your bag. So before leaving the dock, have your ditch bag ready to go in case you must go.


### Cruising

#### You'll know him by his smile.


You've probably seen Gene Brown out on the race course, sailing Mystic or crewing on Windsong. He's usually smiling.

Gene has been sailing Windseeker races since 1991 and has also participated in several long races as well. Along the way, Gene and his wife, Louise, served as CYCT Social Chairs and Gene served as Commodore.

#### Louise

Gene's wife, Louise, was his sailing companion. When they met, neither of them had ever sailed much before. Yet, together, they raced many long races. They raced Swiftsure several times. And, they did the Pacific Cup twice, in 1998 and 2000, sailing it in their Islander 40, Mystic.

On the way down to San Francisco for the first Pacific Cup race, they were caught in a fierce storm off of Cape Mendecino. They put up a storm jib and reefed the main. They considered taking down the main but decided that it would be too hard to do. The storm lasted eight hours. Gene and Louise took turns at the helm, steering until they could no



The Pacific Cup race itself also was trying; it was just the two of them. They tore three spinnakers during squalls. They were leading their class on the 8<sup>th</sup> day when they tore their last spinnaker.

The Hawaiian Islands were a welcome sight when they finally came into view. When Gene and Louise arrived, it was dark so they expected no one would be up. But, there was a whole crowd of friends waiting. Gene and Louise had finished the race in 12 ½ days and placed 5<sup>th</sup> in their class.



Two years later they raced the Pacific Cup again with a full crew. But, it was not nearly as good because they got caught in the doldrums and ran out of wind

Later, Gene and Louise would sail their boat to Mexico for long stays and come home to Washington during the summer.

#### Service to the CYCT

After Gene and Louise married in 1993, their first job in the CYCT was as Social Chairs. They planned fun outings like roller skating, bowling, and a Holloween party. There was also a crab feed at Dockton and a salmon bake in Quartermaster.

Gene was Commodore in 2000. Gene remembered the main issue that year was whether or not to build a clubhouse similar to TYC's. Gene was opposed to

the idea.

#### Racing in the 90s

At the time Gene started racing in 1991, the Windseeker races were casual. Gene explained that the start line was between the Tyee log-boom and the barges. One of the racers would call out the racecourse. The course was set around fixed buoys and there was no race committee boat.

Gene said the only rule was "Don't hit anyone." There were no protests. Gene recalls that sailors did not take advantage of the rules. They were courteous and demonstrated good sportsmanship. This certainly describes Gene on the race course. The sailor who smiles.





#### SHOVING OFF

#### **Just Living**



We moved to Washington from Portland, Oregon some 34 years ago. The majority of those years have been spent within walking distance of the water. A long walk maybe, but we did it. Many years ago, long before we started sailing, we had briefly contemplated moving back to Oregon, but I liked living near the water, specifically, the salt water.

But that has nothing to do with this article.

There is a mysterious force in water that draw things to it. A force that pulls anything and everything that you want safe, secure, and dry, to almost leap in! It affects glasses, knives, shackles, screw drivers, clothing, food, anything! I've lost everything on this list at least one and I didn't even mention nuts and bolts!

This is an amazing phenomena and we've all seen it. And heard it! Seldom do items just plunge in! They usually take a few hops first, almost teasing you that they intend to stay dry. You see or hear that hop, hop, and a pause. You think "this time it will stay on board." But it doesn't. In it goes.

My most recent experience was with my Leatherman multi tool. I was on the swim step. I knew of water's tricky ways and set the tool up on the bulwark of the main deck, safe so I thought, from the water. So I thought! When I pulled a bucket from the main deck down to the swim step, its rope grabbed the Leatherman. Hop onto the swim step locker. Hop onto the swim step deck. Splash!

Shirt pockets seem to be the worst and lead to the most expensive items going in. Two years ago, while going through the locks on the way to Opening Day, my hearing aid battery started to run out. For those who don't know, when this happens, a series of tones plays in your ear – about every five minutes – and it's annoying. Having other things to worry about, I removed the aid and dropped it into my shirt pocket. When one goes, they both go, and the second aid went into the pocket. I didn't think about these again until I leaned over the rail to attach the club banner. Plop! (Shirt pocket items do not hop, they go straight in.) Thank goodness for the full replacement warranty.

I wasn't so lucky with a pair of glasses just a month ago. I'd swapped them out for my sunglasses and had put them, you guessed it, into my front pocket. Straight into the water in Swantown marina in Olympia. Now I have a strong magnet on a long line, but these glasses were titanium (and expensive). Not magnetic. Having ultra-low tides we tried scraping the bottom with Rylie's shrimp net taped to the handle of the boat hook. Thirty minutes of scraping the bottom brought up nothing except fowl smelling ooze and shells. I'll stick to my cheap, mail-order glasses from now on.

The scientist in me tried to reason out this phenomena, thinking that it might be a sort of gravitational pull, and water, covering so much of the earth's surface, simply overcomes land in the pull department. Trouble is, the density of water is much less than that of soil or concrete. But there's more water. I'm sure you need calculus, differential equations, or vector analysis to work this out and I vowed to never go near any of these mathematical sciences again after graduating university.

This pull, it's a mystery. But I think we make some rules:

- Unless it has a button flap, never use your shirt pocket. Same goes for dropping glasses into the vee of your shirt neck.
- When in your dinghy do not put anything into your back pants pocket (cell phone, wallet x 2).
- If you are going to give your three-year old granddaughter something to hold, make sure you can spare it (screw driver).
- Falling through water, an item can travel as far sideways as downwards. (Framing square verified at low tide.)
- When you hear a splash and wonder "what was that?" The answer is "something expensive!" (Orbital polisher)
- The likelihood of dropping something is proportional to:
  - ♦ It's cost
  - ♦ The depth
  - ♦ The chance that you have another
- Buying a magnet reduces the likelihood of dropping magnetic items.
- Clothing sinks slowly
- Credit cards sink slowly, but not that slowly.
- Putting a float on your keys will cause you to drop the keys without a float.

That's about it for the attraction of water. I'd like to leave with some encouraging words, but I don't have any.
