Racing

I'm going to let everyone in on a few changes for next year that will be coming out in our next race book - looking to be published on or around mid December. Now, many of the changes are being done to address issues over past races and hopefully give our race committee and racers more options.....

First - we will credit a yacht's skipper with a discount on the purchase of a yearly race program for having crewmembers help with race committee.

Second - we have updated our rules to address unsportsmanlike conduct, which can include operating a boat in an unsafe fashion, failure to adhere to the racing rules of sailing, violating COLREGs, or derogatory or disrespectful interaction/communication with the race committee. We have had a number of issues over the years with people not following the rules - this will stop now before someone gets hurt or boats get damaged.

Third - All yachts MUST respond to RC hails

Forth - All yachts who quit races early MUST inform the RC

Fifth - Safety inspections may happen and yachts selected MUST comply with RC instructions

Sixth - For any boat racing that has AIS, they are going to be expected to have it on during races.

Finally, the big change. We will be going to race courses posted on a reader board on Romeo Charlie. This is for all races including the Point/Harbor series where even the distance races will be adjusted to the daily conditions and our Commencement Bay races. Courses will not be announced over the radio and sailors must go by the RC boat to see the course.

I know these changes may be a bit difficult at the start, but all of these are being implemented to address issues.

Be sure to read the entire manual once it goes out......

Have a Happy Holiday and we will see you on the first race on January 25th

Cruising


That's All Folks





SHOVING OFF

Winter Waterland



As I write this, I am sitting in a nice hotel room in Portland, Oregon, the lovely and gracious Mrs. St. John's and my hometown. We have seemingly unlimited internet, cable tv, plentiful heat and a shower big enough for a family. Such luxury! We're here to visit family on the Thanksgiving weekend and naturally, there have been lots of questions from them about boat living; do we like it, is this our first winter aboard, can we keep warm?

Well first, this is not our first winter aboard. We moved aboard in August of 2018, so we now have some experience and we've learned a thing or two. Winter brings with it special challenges. It's wetter, colder, and darker. Let's talk about these challenges, what we've learned, and the rewards.

The chief special challenge – can we keep warm? The simple answer is "yes", but it's complicated. One of the first things that you learn living on a boat is that power is not endless. As soon as we bought La Sirena, I began to convert almost all lighting to LED. Because of this, lighting is not a concern, especially when connected to the dock. We sip electricity where lighting is concerned. Things that are a concern are things that heat and things that have pumps or motors. The reverse cycle AC that heats the boat is a finicky girl! We can only run one of the two units at a time and don't add anything else that heats when they are running. No toaster, no oven, no microwave. If you must run those, turn off the reverse cycle. Want to use the space heater – turn off the reverse cycle! Want to use the water heater or dehumidifier – you'll probably get away with it. Guess wrong and you're walking down the dock to the electrical panel. But where there's heat and there's warm it is just not everywhere.

Another real concern is water. We have two tanks of about 158 gallons each. During the summer we leave the forward tank empty or near empty. After all, 158 gallons is almost 1300 pounds! We normally use one tank per week. Last winter we had a stretch of almost three weeks with no water on the dock. What did we do? We were careful with water and showered at the main marina bathroom instead of on the boat. Had things become really bad, we could have carted water down by the 10-gallon jug. One of these days I will look at using the water maker which should eliminate that problem!

Then there is the wet! Boats leak. I haven't had one that doesn't. I'm not sure that I know one that doesn't. We have eight overhead hatches. At least six leaked when we bought La Sirena. One stopped on its own. Two are very minor (one can be ignored and one has a rag wrapped around the handle that solves the issue. On the two in Rylie's berth, I replaced the hinge and latch seals. That solved the issues on one but not the other – the solution there – put the dinghy on the forward deck to cover the hatch. I don't like it collecting barnacles all winter anyway. Finally, there is the hatch over the settee. Last winter it had a sheet of plastic over it weighted down by the power cord. This winter I'm more elegant; I've made a canvas cover for the hatch that allows light through. Come spring I will remove that hatch and re-bed it. I'll also likely send the forward hatch off to be rebuilt.

We are fortunate in that La Sirena has a large, enclosed cockpit which received new canvas last winter. With the wind in the marina being pretty predictable, we can keep one canvas door close and one open with minimal water in the cockpit

and yet we aren't constantly unzipping and zipping up a door. Our entry is never wet.

The rewards of winter boat living? It is cozy, quiet, and peaceful here at the marina (well, quiet minus a non-stop chorus of urp, urp, urp, urp, urp. Yes, the sea lions are back.) There's no winter pruning, leaf raking, gutter cleaning. Really, I spend about 30 minutes a week on the water and that's about it. Sunsets are still amazing, just a lot earlier. The docks are near deserted. (It's fun seeing all the boaters in the summer, but it is nice having the quiet in winter as well.

I guess life seems compact and manageable in the winter living on the boat. Is it a challenge? As long as I'm fussing over heat, yes, but a worthwhile challenge.



SHOVING OFF

My Favorite Things Two



A few years ago I wrote about items that I felt were boat owner essentials. With Christmas just around the corner, I thought that I might revisit that list. I'm too lazy to look back at the old list, so this is my list today. These are extra items, not autopilot, AIS, or modern radar – items like that that are a part of the boat. Here they are:

Bucket on a rope – I know that this is a repeat! I've had the same bucket over three boats. Nine plus years. With La Sirena, I had to add a second rope to reach the water, but that's it. I have a deck hose, but so often I just grab that bucket and toss it in the water when something needs a quick rinse.

Multi-meter – I bought my primary multi-meter when I first bought Naughty by Nature. It cost around \$20 and I use it constantly. I have two, better meters with induction clamps, but I still use the first one the most. Knowing if a circuit is live, if it is 12V, 24V or 220 ACV is essential. With LEDs and electronics, you need to know polarity as well.

Range Finder – I saw this in someone else's list last year and Santa brought me one. I use it for anchoring the most. How close is that next boat? Pull out the range finder. Sign says, "keep off 300 feet". Pull out the range finder. That's all it does and that's fine.

Cordless Drill - Just buy one and keep it on your boat. Enough said.

Dyson Vacuum – My last list had my little Eureka. A great vacuum but we have a bigger boat and that cordless Dyson is amazing. It hangs on a charger in the shop and is always ready to go.

Handheld VHF – There's a time to go cheap and this isn't one of them. I view radios – good radios as essential. Need a backup? Need to stay in touch while one the dock? Need to communicate from the dinghy? That's your handheld. There are times when I use it to supplement the boat's VHF just because I don't want to scan channels. I swear by ICOM, but my handheld is a Standard Horizon and it works very well. (I sold my Standard Horizon mounted VHF because it was so tinny.) Floating is a nice feature as well.

GOOD Binoculars - Good ones.

LED Work light – For years I've used a corded, fluorescent light. It was good but limited. Flashlights are good but their beam is focused and they go dead at the wrong moment. My light is USB charged and has a magnet and a hanger. Great for working on the engine, tight spaces, and just for lighting up a big area. Twenty bucks well spent.

Bailing Bucket – Not to be confused with the bucket on a rope. This is a bucket just for bailing. Bailing the dinghy, bailing the bilge, and for us, bailing the bathtub. We have two, one is handy for rinsing a little girl's hair and rinsing the tub – it is cut from an old bleach bottle. I have a second bailing bucket made from a one-gallon oil jug, the rectangular ones. It is handy for bailing flat surfaces.

30 amp to 20 amp adapter – This is an electrical adapter that plugs into the marina power post and allows you to plug in a conventional power tool or extension cord. Even if you aren't struggling with 220 plugs like I am, being able to plug your polisher, pressure washer, or whatever straight into the power post is nice.

I'm sure that you have your ideas. These are mine.
