SHOVING OFF A Place For Everything



If a person was to look at say, my workbench (and I am lucky enough to have a workbench on my boat) they might think "what a mess." But I will argue that it is an organized mess and that I know where every important tool is, and I can tell you where to find it. Why? Well besides making my life easier, I view

it as a safety concern. On a boat, I might need that tool and I might need it NOW! Such as the time the steering on Naughty broke during a TWSA lesson in 20 knot winds. I had the tools I needed in less than a minute. (And after that I had a complete emergency tiller readily accessible.) My boats and RVs have always been set up like that, specific items with a specific place and always there.

Almost as important as what you have and where it is when you need it is what you have that you don't need and is in the way when what you need is behind that thing that you don't need. When you need the bolt cutters because you lost your rig and you need to cut things away, you don't want to have to move a ton of junk to get at them. And sometimes, that thing that is in the way is not a tool or a trinket, but something that was at one time, an integral part of the boat. Over the years that we owned Naughty it seems as if I removed miles of no longer used wiring and plumbing. Why? Not only did things just look cleaner, but I reasoned, if I had to sort out a problem at sea (and I have), I don't want to waste time on wires or hoses that go nowhere.

I've adopted that same strategy on La Sirena. The wiring behind the dash alone is a maze of dead ends, and, judging from how things might or might not light up when you throw the switch, a few crossed wires. For this reason, I've added "labeling" to my arsenal of tricks.

Let's go back to tools for a moment. Add to tools, spare parts. My boat inherited my bag of boat tools from Naughty By Nature, the tools of the previous owner AND the tools of the original owner. Also, since the boat is my home, my home tools as well. Immediately I had to make choices.

Carpentry tools – most are in storage at the marina with only a small portion on the boat. A jig saw, small block plane, and a few basics. Big saws, levels, framing squares, saws all, big hammers and pipe wrenches – marina storage. Big mechanic's tools are in marina storage as well. Some day when we set out for extended trips, I'll bring more aboard.

And yes, parts. La Sirena came with a bunch. Some are new, most are not. I run into a couple of problems with parts 1) what do I have and where are they and 2) are they any good? For example, under every floorboard there seems to be a freshwater pump. I am not sure how many. Three, I think. One had a bad pressure switch, another was a broken wire – I think. The third, who knows! Another compartment has what I think are new or rebuilt injectors! There are also engine water pumps. Then there are the plumbing parts. I know I need a solution for these! I need a map of what is where. I also need to spend some time deciding "do I need it or is it junk?"

Which brings me to what I really wanted to talk about – junk! Stuff in the way. Stuff you don't need. Stuff you didn't even know you have!

Full Disclosure — I've jest spent the last four full days of the Christmas holidays and all of Thanksgiving moving the belongings of my 88-year-old mother-in-law into a storage unit bigger than the two I keep for my families belongings. And only a fraction of it is family heirlooms — the lion's share is junk!

Yes, let's talk junk! I didn't start this column as a lifestyle blog. I started it as a chronicle of our journey from land dwellers to live aboards and eventually cruisers. As a part of that journey, we've been forced to limit junk. Our boat is compact, but at 800 square feet or so, I don't think it qualifies as a tiny home, still, one must think about every item that is brought aboard. I've come to think about junk in a whole new way and even develop some rules for it.

1) If I add something, something must go – this isn't absolute, but I follow this one a lot. Add a shirt? Toss a shirt. Add a favorite mug, lose a favorite mug. Replace a part, get rid of the old one. Which leads me to rule two:

- 2) If it's an old part and can be used in a pinch, you might keep it. If you don't know if it works figure it out and act accordingly. I have to actually enact this rule. Maybe I'll start with the battery charger mounted in the engine room. If it doesn't work it should go.
- 3) It doesn't matter if you have it if 3a) you don't know you have it or 3b) you don't know where it is.
- 4) If you buy it, you are choosing not to buy or have money for something else.

That number four is the big one. Something I've learned in the last couple of years. Something I'd like to leave you with. Most of us have only so much money that passes through our fingers in a lifetime. You can spend it on experiences. You can save it to be free from working a year or too earlier. You can help your family or strangers. You can spend it on stuff that demands care, or storing, or becomes a burden on your children. The choice is yours. And don't get me wrong – I still buy stull. Lots of stuff. But I think once, twice, or three times before I do.
