

I want to make membership aware of an upcoming bylaw amendment. Our Long-Range Planning Committee was tasked with reviewing our membership levels and associated benefits, and to compare them to other clubs throughout the region. Our goal is also to have a thriving Lido fleet, which is coming along nicely. To account for that membership level, and to make some slight adjustments, the board voted to approve the bylaw amendment as proposed by the Long-Range Planning Committee. With that, the next step (per the bylaws) is to notify membership at the next general meeting, and then to vote by the following general meeting. We will be making our March General Meeting a "Special" Meeting in accordance with our bylaw requirements. All active members should have received a notice via email regarding this upcoming "Special" meeting and proposed bylaw amendment. Since we aren't meeting in person, we will have to have some flexibility in this matter on how we conduct the voting process. More details will be announced at or before the March general meeting. We truly believe that the benefits afforded to our adjusted membership levels and associated costs align with neighboring clubs and our goals. I strongly urge all members to approve the amendment. Here is what is proposed for the change:

Existing membership levels in the bylaws:

Article IV: Membership

d) Associate: An Active Member in good standing, who no longer owns a yacht, may continue their membership as an Associate Member. An Associate Member shall be accorded all rights and privileges of membership as an Active Member. Associate Member dues shall be 50% of Active Member dues.

k) Active Non-Boat Owner: An Active Non Boat Owner Member shall pay an initiation fee and annual dues. An Active Non-Boat Owner shall be represented by one vote only. In the case of a married couple, each member may hold office in the club. The Board of Trustees shall have the option of reducing the initiation fee for a membership drive.

Proposed:

d) Associate (Lido owners/Do not own "Yacht" as outlined in Article X): An Associate Member shall pay an initiation fee and annual dues. An Associate Member shall be accorded all rights and privileges of membership as an Active Member, with the exception of race fee discounts and reciprocal rights. An Associate Member may have the rights to the use of the dinghy dock, per a moorage agreement and associated costs. An Associate Member shall be represented by one vote only per membership. In the case of a married couple, each member may hold office in the club. The Board of Trustees shall have the option of reducing the initiation fee for a membership drive. Associate Member dues shall be 50% of Active Member dues.

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Education



Spring is coming. Most of us want to cruise to interesting places. Unless we limit our visits to towns with marinas, we will have to anchor. You can read almost any sailing magazine, or book and learn about anchoring disasters. Anchoring is an essential skill for any cruising sailor. Most important is the proper equipment sized correctly for your boat.

- 1.) The anchor should be of the proper weight and type for your boat and the cruising you intend to do. In my case, my boat is 35' long and weighs about 12,000 pounds. My primary anchor is a 30 pound CQR type. I choose this anchor because of its holding power, and ease of resetting. A danforth anchor is another popular anchor type that is lighter therefore easier to handle, but its harder to reset. It would be a good second anchor.
- 2.) The rode and ground tackle should also be sized to your boat and the type of cruising you are going to do. A chain road is the gold standard for serious cruising. Chain is heavy and hard to handle and needs a windless. It is expensive and adds weight to the bow of your boat. Most of us will opt for a rope (nylon) with a short length of chain attached to the anchor. Take the time to mark the rode every 10 feet or so. This will be helpful for determining scope when you are anchoring. Check your ground tackle regularly for wear, and make sure all the shackles are wired so their pins will not come loose. Many cruisers have a reel of polypropylene line to facilitate the use of a stern anchor or stern ties to land.
- 3.) The killett. This is a weight with a line attached that can be looped over the anchor rode to increase the holding power of the anchor. Lower the weight down the anchor line and tie the killett line to a bow cleat. This will also keep the rode down, lessening the chances of fouling the keel or prop.
- 4.) The boat. We all try to maintain our boats, and keep all our electronics in A-1 condition. Make sure that your depth sounder is accurate. It's a good idea to set the offset to your boat's draft. GPS on a boat is almost mandatory. GPS can be used to navigate narrow channels, and will let you know if your anchor is dragging. Current charts (electronic or paper) of the area you are sailing need to be onboard. Harbor charts and cruising guides are also helpful in finding secure anchorages. Be aware of tidal changes, and make sure your boat will be floating at low tide. Currents or wind may cause your boat to swing. Make sure there is enough sea room so you are clear of other boats. Remember you have to leave room between boats already anchored. Don't put out 200 feet of rode to anchor in 20 feet of water.



SHOVING OFF Stormies

It's Sunday evening and I'm doing the dinner dishes, Rylie is in the tub with grandma standing by, the diesel fire is burning a nice warm glow, the wind is howling, the boat is rocking, and all seems right with the world. There is something special about a storm when you aren't out in the middle of it.

Here in the marina, we can just look around and see the impacts. We can see the white caps just outside the entrance. Inside the marina we can look around and see whose tarp is going to survive. The lines on Sol-Mar across the way are blown out in a big arch. I'm thinking, "boy, those are loose" and, "I hope for his sake that they don't come undone or he has a real mess on his hands." Here on La Sirena, We have the halyards pretty well sorted out. I know that loose, clanging halyards will mean a middle of the night trip to the deck to quiet them down.

The lovely and gracious Mrs. St. John will stop and watch storms any time of the day and night. I like to listen too storms, she likes to watch. The recent snowstorm held a special challenge for her as we had to go out on deck and brush the snow off the windows in order to see out.

If the storm is especially bad, we might go out and walk the dock to check the lines on other boats. La Sirena is secured with four, heavy dock lines, properly arranged and cleated. Our biggest issue is if the wind switches direction, blowing the boat away from the dock instead of into the dock as is usual. If that is the case, you have to be prepared to step across a one-foot gap instead of straight onto the dock step. It's a small consideration and any break in the wind I will take up the slack and reduce the gap.

A storm at the dock is a marvel of nature to enjoy. A storm in open water, not so much!

Some of our most formative experiences as sailors have been sailing in storms. I remember our first one in Selma, our little Cal-21. We really didn't have a clue how to sail. I just remember running down-wind and running out of sea room, trying to work the courage up to turn back into the wind while the lovely and gracious Mrs. S had her head in her hands cursing repeatedly. We survived of course, hugged each other at the dock, and went straight to the store for a bottle of wine. Not long afterward I got my first sailing lessons. That wouldn't be our last storm! I suppose it never well be until we hang up our foulies. Another memorable storm was the sail from Shilshole to Des Moines in our Cal 2-27 one September. Tacoma was our destination, but because of the 45 knot winds we settled for Des Moines. We'd done the best we could with a scrap of sail, an outboard and diesel engine both going, but after five hours, we were wet and beat and looking for shelter.

Encountering a storm while underway is something to endure and survive and talk about later. I'm not sure it is something to enjoy.

Somewhere between a storm at the dock and a storm underway on the excitement scale is a storm at anchor. We've been through a few and learned some lessons along the way. The first big blow we anchored in was at Port Townsend on Naughty by Nature. The winds were only in the low teens, but something about the lines on that boat or the keel stepped mast really amplified the noise in the boat making it seem much worse. Add to that that we were headed straight to Victoria in the morning – our longest open water passage ever – had us a little unnerved. Once again, we survived and got a little smarter in the process. Someday we'll match the storm at dock experience while at anchor, enjoying it fully without fear. We came close last year on Stewart Island. We knew that the storm was coming. We knew we needed to hole up. We weighed our options and headed to Reid Harbor, a favorite of mine. Motoring northwest into the harbor I double checked with the L and G Mrs. S. "Where is the storm coming from?"

"The southeast she said."
I guess we're still learning.
