Our club has so much momentum and excitement for 2024. I can't wait to get started as Commodore.



Treasurer Report



Bank accounts

Cash: Down a tiny bit (1.6%) from last year at this time Romeo Charlie Reserve: Up a 24.7% from last year at this time Total, including reserves: Up 13.4 from this time last year

The Romeo Charlie Reserve is a planned effort to be prepared in the case of the need to replace the race committee boat or its engine. It is primarily funded by monthly transfers of \$300 from the checking account.

Reports comparing year-end 2023 to 2022 can be requested by members as PDFs, showing our financial position and activity.

A few things that will help you understand the reports:

- Some of the things we do tend to extend across two calendar years, especially the Commodore's Ball and Holiday Party. So 2023's Commodore's Ball transactions are related to both 2023 and 2024, and 2022 includes parts of 2022 and 2023. We started selling tickets earlier this year, so we have more revenue collected in Calendar 2023. And we prepared a check for the band in December for the upcoming Ball, so it shows in the 2023 records.
- Romeo Charlie maintenance tends to fluctuate year to year depending on the timing and nature of the work. 2023 is substantially higher than 2022 in part because we did a lot of work just after year-end 2022 and just before year-end 2023. Historically, 2022 was quite low and 2023 was quite high.
- The activity report does not show amounts transferred to the Romeo Charlie reserve. The financial position report does show the change in reserve balance.

Historian Report

Happy New Year and Welcome 2024!

This year CYCT is celebrating 50 years on the water! For this landmark year, it seemed fitting to compile a club history to celebrate its members, look back on accomplishments and experiences, and reflect on our direction as we toast the next decade. To that end, the Clubhouse has a pair of file cabinets with numerous random artifacts providing clues about our club's storied past. A first hearty thank you goes out to Joy Ballentine who took a run at random stash and compiled the following list of Past Commodores.

Following is a VERY skeletal overview of CYCT's first 50 years—YES. There is A LOT missing here. Deeper dives into The File Cabinets are daily revealing additional juicy details of our club's past.

1970's focus: July 30, 1974 the first CYCT meeting was officially held at the Top of the Ocean, and Dave Neff became CYCT commodore in the first elections held. First orders of business were to establish the club charter, incorporation documents and PIYA accreditation. The focus of the club was to design a sailing program to support small boat owners by providing an affordable one-design racing program. Early club events supported Star, Thistle, Thunderbird and San Juan 24 fleets as well as a Junior program. By the end of 1975 the club had 50 charter members, had hosted the Adams Cup, a women's sailing program hosted by Marilyn Thordarson, and a Swiftsure one-design race (the old Swiftsure lightship resided in Gig Harbor at that time). In 1979 the club contracted with Ole and Charlie's Marinas for moorage and storage, a crane for launching, and the construction of a clubhouse facility which the club moved into that year. Club one-design fleets and junior sailing flourished into the 1980's. Partnerships with the Sea Scouts and The Odyssey formed during this time as well.

1980's focus: One-design and Junior programs continued going strong. By the mid-80's the clubhouse pilings and the then committee boat were in need of repairs, and expenses began piling up, prompting a dues increase, which unfortunately prompted a resignation backlash. Finances became a challenge as the relationship with Ole and Charlie's began to dissolve. An additional focus on other social activities developed in an attempt to expand the membership. In 1982 the first Commodore's Ball was held, a tradition we celebrate over 40 years later. On through the 80's as financial struggles mounted, the club liquidated many of its assets an as the relationship with Ole and Charlie's became increasingly contentious. As the Board continued visioning, working on financial solvency and finding a new home for the club, the club's racing programs continued to thrive. CYCT was well-represented in many regional regattas in Canada and the Northwest. Social and cruising focuses also

gained traction with many local weekend events, fund-raising, and involvement with the 1983 America's Cup promotion. Membership and club structures were also refined during this time with a revision of the bylaws, establishment of initiation fees, formalized levels of club membership, and affiliation with the International Order of the Blue Gavel, an organization for PC's of recognized yacht clubs worldwide. During this decade CYCT was also instrumental in the development of the Tacoma Area Racing Council (TARC) which further strengthened Tacoma racing. In 1987 a container was delivered to Tyee Marina to house the Junior program—the very same structure that has become the current CYCT Clubhouse. The Club Banner/burgee was developed in 1989.

1990's focus: Increased publicity to expand membership was a focus for the 90's. Ads were placed in 48° North, and new members were introduced and celebrated at general meetings. The vaunted Ruptured Chicken appeared in 1990, and cruises became a little more structured, incorporating hosts and themes. Long-range yachting gained a greater focus as members wandered further afield. In 1991 a 4-boat flotilla circumnavigated Vancouver Island. During the 1990's at least two club boats competed in the Pacific Cup--Tom Saul and crew on Hooligan, and Gene Brown and crew aboard Mystic. In 1992 the burgee was updated to our current design. After the many shifts in clubhouse venues and financial struggles, the 1990's also welcomed Johnny's as the CYCT meeting venue that would continue through 2019.

2000's focus: Billy and Soo Carter, the Dynamic Duo, continued refinements of CYCT's racing and cruising programs. With 9/11 and the security panic caused by the collapse of the twin towers, USCG regulations tightened and the informality of the WindSeekers became a greater challenge. As a result, WindSeeker founder and long-time custodian Larry King bequeathed WindSeekers to the club, and Wednesday nights became more formal. With Billy Carter as race chair, the club embraced and retooled WindSeekers, acquired the first Romeo Charlie (along with the first legitimate tetrahedron race marks), and launched three new series that formalized a year-round race program in Tacoma. Concurrently with Soo as the Cruise chair, the club's cruising outings were bumped to the next level. Soo was a master of publicity and creativity, adding new themes to cruises and supporting and promoting member hosts for each cruise in order to widen the circle of club member involvement. Club raft-ups became a sight to behold during this era with upward of 20 boats rafted on many weekends throughout the year.

2010's focus: Romeo Charlie was a brilliant addition to the club's assets, aiding forward momentum for the racing, and even cruising programs. Ridden hard, by the early 2010's Romeo Charlie I was getting tired and becoming a drain on the club, so in 2014 RC II replaced the old Romeo Charlie as the racing program underwent several refinements under the leadership of Steven Ryan, then Don Kimball. In 2012 Women's Sailing was launched by Commodore Cheryl White and yours truly, in an effort to promote dialogue, learning and seamanship among our membership. Thursday evening programs included lessons in navigation, line handling, docking, rules of the road, sail handling, and the occasional Fireball Seminar. In 2012-2015 the CYCT racing program saw new skippers as Joy Ballentine, Janice VanRavenswaay and Angie Morales stepped behind the wheels on Wednesday nights, and Janet Wenderoth, in preparation for Respite's Big Left Turn onto the Pacific in 2016, co-hosted an "unsupervised" captaincy of Respite to Gig Harbor for the Gybe-Ho's cruise in 2015. While racing and cruising for the last couple decades has been the bread and butter of our club, tending to assets and meeting venue have been perennial topics on the table for the board. Interest in Johnny's as the club's meeting venue was a frequent topic for the board in the mid-late 2010's.

2020's focus: While the perennial discussion of club meeting venue smoldered on, Covid forced the issue in March of 2020, and meetings were conducted on Zoom for a few months. Johnny's is no more,

and so when restrictions lifted we found ourselves on a "flexible venue model" for meetings, which included Sluggo (now Coco's), 7 Seas, and now the SandBar. June-August business meetings are still conducted at The Clubhouse (still a fineable offense to refer to The Clubhouse as "the container"--\$1.00 per occurrence—check out the bylaws). In 2020ish under the guidance of Chuck Queen and Greg Greene the club saw a resurgence in dinghies with weekly Lido sailing. Immediate Past Commodore Coyne has been eminently influential in establishing and promoting the Pink Boat in Tacoma since 2017, an event that has gained increased support every year. Cruising and Racing are still going strong, and the CYCT boards are continuously updating and refining club traditions.

Over the next few months I am looking forward to returning to The Oracle of The File Cabinets and interviewing PC's and key contributors to our past to learn more and share insights about our club's people, "then and now" perspectives, and key focuses/legacies/traditions through our first 50 years, in an effort to perhaps inform the focus for our next ten years. Maybe even develop a section cleverly entitled "History" on the CYCT website(?). And answer some of the ZILLION questions raised as this report was cobbled together from the available resources uncovered so far. Sail on. Enjoy the journey!
